

What is Economics?

Economics is a social science that analyzes how people, businesses, and governments make decisions and how they can make the best of their limited resources. Economics provides tools for understanding public policy issues like inequality, poverty, education, health, taxes, globalization, and the environment.

How broad is an Economics Concentration?

Economics is much broader than many people realize! You can take classes about race and inequality, mass media, global warming, internet marketplaces, game theory, finance, big data, ...the list goes on. Economics sheds light on questions in urban studies, international relations, development studies, and political science.
